1. Read "Act 1 of Romeo and Juliet."	<p>Type of Technology: Adapted Books</p> <p>Product Name: No Fear Shakespeare</p> <p>Rationale: These books help students who are not on grade in their reading level. They help students will enjoy the story and participate in the classroom activities.</p>	<p>Type of Technology: Students with visual impairments can convert the text to an audio file and have the text read aloud to them.</p> <p>Product Name: Natural Reader</p> <p>Rationale: Students with vision impairments will be able to hear the text, which can be much easier than reading.</p> <p>Type of Technology: Low-Tech</p> <p>Product Name: Reading Guides</p> <p>Rationale: Students can use these low tech tools to better follow along in the text and it will help them get their place and focus.</p>

Students will identify the main events in Act I.	<p>Type of Technology: Graphic Organizers</p> <p>Product Name: Inspiration</p> <p>Rationale: Some students struggle with organization and do better when they can organize something visually.</p>	<p>Type of Technology: Word Prediction Software</p> <p>Product Name: CoWriter 6</p> <p>Rationale: Students will use CoWriter 6 to summarize the main events in Act I. This will reduce the amount of typing for students with physical disabilities that may limit their typing abilities.</p>
3. Students will define vocabulary in the text.	<p>Type of Technology: Talking Dictionary</p> <p>Product Name: Talking Dictionary</p>	<p>Type of Technology: Scan/Read</p> <p>Kurzweill 3000</p>

	<p>Rationale: This will help students with reading comprehension because it allows them to look up unfamiliar words. It also is helpful for students who need things read aloud to them.</p>	<p>Rationale: Students who are visually impaired or blind can use this software to look up definitions of words.</p>
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
